“ To Audrey and Family:

I was on his "list" and that made me feel special. Every month I was on Yehuda's Rosh Chodesh list. without fail for the past several years Yehuda called me at the end of every month to remind me that Rosh Chodesh was coming up, what date it would start and end and which month it was. But he started every conversation with "how's your brother...how's your mother". No one else ever asked as consistent and as soft as Yehuda. I made it a point to never miss his calls or to always call him back because he cared enough to add me to his list. Often times we spoke about life, about Torah, about Florida, about the Rebbe....in some instances we stayed on the phone for more than 10 minutes. No matter how busy I was, who I was with or what I was doing, I took his call because his calls were pure innocence, and it gave me a break from all the craziness of life - he had no other agenda other than reminding me about the new month and I found that beautiful that he was giving and not taking. It was a breath of fresh air to be able to speak with someone who had no other agenda other than to offer his knowledge. He told me his dream was to visit the Rebbes grave in NY but that he was scared of flying. I would always say, one day him and I will go on a road trip to NY together and would play loud music (the music he use to like). And so, I was touched deeply by his passing. We lost a pure soul..someone who wanted to share rather than take. As the sages would say "we live temporarily through what we take..we live forever through what we give". I know that every month I will be reminded of the call I will never get to remind me of the new month but also know that Yehuda will be with me month after month as I think of the calls that I missed. In the Torah Hashem teaches us that the appropriate response to such loss was silence for there is something about death that is forever inexplicable – all explanations in the world can not eliminate the devastation, pain, shock and grief. The 1st answer to death is that there is no answer until end times. We must recognize that Hashem remains the source of our comfort and our resilience in the face of grief and a certain peace when one believes not just in this temporal world but in the world to come. There are no words other than Yehuda was a shining example of

what we should all strive to become - selfless and giving of ourselves to others.
